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Question 1

- (vi) Write an original short story that **begins** with the following words:

Question 4

Read the passage given below and answer the questions (i), (ii) and (iii) that follow.

- (1) It was a mellow October morning in the countryside. Judson Webb entered the primitive living room of his mountain camp and opened a cupboard in which he kept his most prized possessions. Among them were bottles of exotic and expensive fruit juices gifted to him. Not even his wife was allowed to have a key for he felt a sense of deep outrage if the cupboard was touched by any hand but his own. 5
- (2) He had been packing his things and getting ready to leave. He looked at the shelf in the cupboard on which the fruit juices were kept. All the bottles were unopened except one which had only half of the grape juice left in it. A small glass stood by its side. 10
- (3) As he took it from the shelf, he smiled in a sinister manner. His wife, Maria spoke from the adjoining bedroom. "I'm all packed, Judson. Has not Alec come to get the keys?" Alec was the caretaker for the city folks when they were away. "He's down at the lake and will be back in half an hour," replied Judson. 15
- (4) Maria came into the room carrying her suitcase. But she paused in surprise as she saw the bottle in her husband's hand. "Judson!" she exclaimed, "We'll be late if you sit down to have juice in the morning." 20
- "You wrong me, my dear," he chuckled, "I'm not drinking anything out of this bottle. I am merely putting a little 'kick' into it. Someone has had a drink from this bottle while we were away."
- She dreaded that tone of his voice. Her eyes narrowed as she watched him. He put upon the table two tiny white tablets as he started to open the bottle.

- (5) "Whoever broke into my cupboard and stole the expensive drink will probably try it again once we are out of here," he went on, "only this time he will wish he had not." 25
- She caught her breath at the cruelty of his manner as one by one he dropped the tablets into the bottle and held it up to watch them dissolve.
- She asked, "What are they? Something to make the intruder sick?" 30
- "And how!" He seemed fascinated as he saw the harmless drink change into a dangerous dose. He closed his bottled vengeance and set it back on the shelf alongside the little glass.
- "Everything nice and handy," he remarked approvingly. "Now, Mr. Thief, when you break in, drink hearty; I won't stop you." 35
- (6) Maria's face grew pale. "Don't do it, Judson," she gasped. "It's horrible. You have no right to take the law into your own hands."
- "Of course, I have every right! When it comes to protecting my property, I make my own laws," he thundered.
- "But all the thief did was to steal a little fruit juice. He did not do any real damage," she pleaded. 40
- "That's not the point," he said. "If a man holds me up and robs me of five dollars, it makes me just as angry as if he took a hundred. A thief is a thief."
- (7) It was useless to argue, she knew. He had always been ruthless in business. He was vindictive when offended by anyone. Things had to be done *his* way. 45
- (8) She turned toward the outer door with a sigh of defeat. "I will walk down the road and say goodbye at the farmhouse," she said while leaving. Judson started to close the cupboard, but paused because he remembered his boots were drying outside on the mahogany table. So, he went to fetch them.
- (9) Alec was coming up from the lake and waved to him from a distance. A monkey sitting near the table heard Judson's heavy footstep, abandoned the banana it had stolen and fled. Judson stepped on the banana, his foot slid, and his head struck the massive table as he fell. 50
